Radical Amazement

On the first Easter morning, according to Mark's Gospel, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome brought spices to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body, one final gesture of love and care.

After encountering a young man dressed in white and finding the tomb empty, they fled, for "terror and amazement had seized them" (Mark 16:8).

The ending of Mark's Gospel may puzzle us – or at least, the ending of some of the oldest manuscripts of Mark's Gospel. It concludes with women running away in fear and wonder. They leave without telling anyone, or at least not yet. But what, we may want to ask, did they do next?

We may wonder why Mark's Gospel does not give us a more finished ending like some of the other New Testament Gospels. Mark's Gospel may strike us as something like a loose end.

In these Winter and Spring months, folks in the

Wednesday Bible study have observed for me that Mark often does not explain what people and events mean, and perhaps, we do not need to explain or understand everything. I am beginning to think and feel that "amazement" is a perfectly good description of the first Easter and of most days.

The resurrection of Christ on the first Easter morning was wrapped in hope-filled mystery, and lest we forget, mystery encircles us every day.

On April 11th, we will begin our next book study with Dacher Keltner's book, Awe: The New Science of Everyday Wonder and How It Can Transform Your Life. Though he is not a Christian, he explores deeply spiritual questions, as he asks, "How can we live a good life? One enlivened by joy and community and meaning, that brings us a sense of worth and belonging and strengthens the people and natural environments around us? Now, twenty years into teaching happiness, I have an answer: find awe."

While I must confess to not yet reading the whole book, I can say I am very interested in the book. Christian and Jewish spiritual leaders have said that awe is the beginning of faith. Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel went so far as to say that to be spiritual is to live in radical amazement.

I am looking forward to sharing conversations centered around this book for many reasons, not least among them is that we would all do well to slow down long enough to be amazed.

May this Easter season fill you with joy and wonder.



Big blue recycling bin is for recyclable materials only. Please do not put any trash in this one.





In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus announces the good news that the reign of God has arrived (1:14-15). Is this announcement still good and timely news for us today? The reign of God means liberation, healing, and wholeness for individuals and communities. Jesus invites anyone who will listen to join him in witnessing the reign of God. Ched Myers has observed, "Mark's Gospel…is a story by, about, and for those committed to God's work of justice, compassion, and liberation in the world." The Gospel of Mark is the oldest and shortest of the four gospels in the New Testament. In this sermon series, we will explore Jesus as the physician and the church as a field hospital.


Special Committee


Nancy has introduced many new updates to the preschool program, navigated the Covid pandemic, and maintained a high level of excellence that we have come to value about the preschool.


Awe: The New Science of Everyday Wonder and How It Can Transform Your Life

By Dacher Kelter Penguin Press, 2023

We will begin a new book on Tuesday, April 11th at 7pm on Zoom

From the front book flap: "Awe is mysterious. How do we quantify the goose bumps we feel when we see the Grand Canyon, or the utter amazement when we watch a child walk for the first time? How do you put into words the collective effervescence of standing in a crowd and singing in unison, or the wonder you feel while gazing at centuries-old works of art? Up until fifteen years ago, there was no science of awe, the feeling we experience when we encounter vast mysteries that transcend our understanding of the world. Scientists were studying emotions like fear and disgust, emotions that seemed essential to human survival. Revolutionary thinking, though, has brought into focus how, through the span of evolution, we've met our most basic needs socially. We've survived thanks to our capacities to cooperate, form communities, and create culture that strengthens our shared identity – actions that are sparked by awe."

From the back book flap: "Dacher Keltner is a professor of psychology at the University of California, Berkeley, and the faculty director of UC Berkeley's Great Good Science Center. A renowned expert in the science human emotion, Dr. Keltner studies compassion and awe, how we express emotion, and how emotions guide our moral identities and search for meaning. His research interests also span issues of power, status, inequality, and social class. He is the author of The Power of Paradox: How We Gain and Lose Influence and the bestselling book Born to be Good: The Science of a Meaningful Life, and the coeditor of The Compassionate Instinct: The Science of Human Goodness."

HAVE YOU EVER WONDERED ABOUT THE HISTORY OF OUR CHANCEL CROSS?

The Chancel Cross in our Sanctuary came from East San Diego Presbyterian Church as part of the merge with College Park Presbyterian Church in March 1995.

Ray and Bea Arntson commissioned artist James Hubbell to create the cross in honor of their son David who tragically died in a hotel fire during the last layover on his way to report for military duty in Viet Nam. David had issues in his life to deal with and his father felt the military would be the place to get him on the right track.

The actual commission was for the cross and a piece for the altar, however, the altarpiece disappeared during the merge and we have not been able to trace its whereabouts.

No one seems to recall whether suggestions had been made to James Hubbell about the creation of the cross or whether he was given full artistic freedom. There have been two thoughts on the symbolism on the burst in the center of the cross. One has been that the burst symbolizes that one has to go through Christ (what He did on the cross for us) for salvation; the other was that it symbolizes the resurrection that followed three days later.

ABOUT JAMES HUBBELL, THE ARTIST [FROM THE UNION TRIBUNE]

James Hubbell is an artist, architectural designer, a poet, jeweler, sculptor and designer in metal, wood, stained glass, and tile. He is also a teacher to students of architecture and design throughout the world.

Hubbell's formal education was at Cranbrook Art Academy in 1955-56 where he studied Eli Saarinen's accommodation to nature and applied it to his own work.

Travel inspired his work, including tours of Europe where he encountered the work of Gaudi; Africa and its rich sculptural traditions; and Asia, where he painted murals for the Army while serving in the Korean War.

Hubbell has received numerous awards, honors, and lifetime achievement recognition from such varied organizations as Rotary International, the National Endowment for the Arts, the American Institute of Architects, the United Nations Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Award, and the Pacific Coast Builders Conference.

Both nature and landscape play a central role in what James Hubbell creates, but there is a different way of looking at his aesthetic. With little exception his is an art not so much about landscape, but as landscape. Rather than illustrating or shaping the landscape, the majority of his work embodies or emulates nature.

James Hubbell's public art is available to visit in many areas throughout San Diego County, Baja Mexico, and the West Coast.

It is impossible to imagine Hubbell's body of work as separate from the place in which it is rooted, which is Ilan-Lael, the place. The architectural vocabularies of Gaudi and Hubbell, for example, are no more obvious than the form and texture that the indigenous manzanita shares with his iron work, or the native flora shares with his delicate line drawings or the leaded lines in his stained glass pieces.

This place where Hubbell lives is simultaneously a nurturer, a resource, a reference, a shelter, a launch pad, and a retreat. It's also a pedestal on which, and around which, the artist continues his personal affirmation.

Easter Egg Hunt following the church service Come one, come all!




- Clean cardboard egg carton
- Scissors
- Acrylic paint and paintbrush
- Flat cardboard
- Photo, drawing or note
- Small pom-poms



What you do:

- 1. Bend, stretch and cut the carton cups to make 3-D flower shapes. Also cut leaf shapes from the carton top.
- Paint the flowers and leaves. Let dry.
- 3. Cut the flat cardboard to a size and shape you desire. Leave a border at least 2 inches larger than your photo, drawing or note.
- 4. With hot glue, attach the photo, drawing or note to the cardboard.
- Arrange and glue flowers and leaves around the border. Attach pom-poms for more color and texture.
